Food

Food in the UK is more diverse than ever, but some traditional dishes are still enjoyed:

Afternoon Tea – A light meal usually served in the late afternoon, including tea, finger sandwiches, scones with jam and cream, and small cakes.

Sunday Roast – A traditional Sunday meal featuring roast meat (usually beef, chicken, lamb or pork), potatoes, vegetables, and Yorkshire pudding, all covered in gravy.

Fish and Chips – Fried battered fish with chips (fries), usually eaten with mushy peas and vinegar. Often served in takeaways or near the seaside.

Full English Breakfast – A hearty breakfast that may include eggs, bacon, sausages, beans, tomatoes, mushrooms, toast, and sometimes black pudding.

Not usually eaten every day, but popular on weekends or in cafes.

Weather

The British are known for talking about the weather ///because it changes often and can be unpredictable. You might get sunshine, rain, and wind in the same day, even in summer. Winters are usually cold and wet, while summers are mild with average highs around 20–25°C.

Snow is uncommon but does happen sometimes. People often dress in layers and carry an umbrella or waterproof jacket.

Talking about the weather is also a popular way to start a conversation.

British Culture

Queueing is an important part of British life, and people take it seriously — everyone is expected to wait their turn at shops, bus stops, or for food, and skipping the queue is seen as rude.

Sport is also central to British culture, with football being the most popular, followed by rugby, cricket, tennis (especially during Wimbledon), and Formula 1, often sparking lively debates and uniting or dividing the nation during big matches.

Getting Around Southend & Beyond

Southend has great public transport links, making it easy to get around town or travel further afield.

Trains:

Regular services run from Southend Central and Southend Victoria - it's about 1 hr 15 mins to London. Save 1/3 on fares with a 16–25 Railcard (£35 a year or £80 for 3 years). Buy tickets at stations or via apps like Trainline or Trip.

Buses:


Single fares cost around £2–£2.80, or get a Day Pass for £6. Student passes (ages 16–19) start at £27.50 for a week. Use Tap & Cap with contactless - capped at £22 per week. Check routes and times on the First Bus App.

Airport Bus:

The X30 Airlink connects Southend, Southend Airport, Rayleigh, Chelmsford, and Stansted. It's £3 per journey, with tickets available from the driver or the First Bus App.

VISAs



It's important to tap your student card each time you enter class. You can do

this from 15 minutes before the lecture starts until 15 minutes after. Tapping your card outside of these times will mark you as absent. Visa holders are expected to attend all teaching events in person, unless you have an authorised approved absence request. If you have any enquiries about your Visa or Immigration status, please use the form on this page to submit your question: www1.essex.ac.uk/immigration/enquiry/ Check your university email every day- Important updates are sent there, including changes to teaching events and updates from your department.

If you are struggling to pay your fees, speak to the university about a payment plan for tuition fees, that can make things easier.

Create an account on Gradintelligence to access your official certificates like the Certificate of Registration and academic transcripts.

Make sure you understand any Student Visa conditions about working during your studies – breaching these conditions can have serious implications for you.

For one-to-one help, especially with financial matters, visit the Student Services Hub in the Silberrad building.

Working in the UK



Working or Volunteering During Your Studies

You can usually do part-time work or volunteering while you study, but some types of work aren't allowed.

If you're on a Student Visa and studying at degree level or above, you can normally work up to 20 hours per week in term time and unlimited hours in holidays - just check what counts as "holidays" for your course.

Always check your visa conditions before starting work. Find full guidance here: essex.ac.uk/student/immigration-and-visas/working-in-the-uk-during-your-studies

To work in the UK, you'll need a National Insurance (NI) number. You may already have one linked to your visa, but if not, apply online at gov.uk/apply-national-insurance-number



Registering with a GP:

You can register with any local GP - it's quick and free. Register online via the NHS website and have your photo ID, proof of address, and Immigration Health Surcharge reference number ready.

Shopping Tips for International Students

Southend has plenty of places to shop for everyday essentials and international foods.

World food stores: Kim Quang (Asian), Southend Food Centre (Oriental), Sabri Foods & Khan Supermarket (Halal), and Easy Way Food (African/Caribbean).
Supermarkets: Lidl, Tesco, Iceland, Sainsbury's, Aldi.
Budget shops: Poundland and Poundstretcher for low-cost household items.

Save while you shop: Use Tesco Clubcard, Nectar Card, or the Lidl Plus app for discounts. Most stores accept contactless and offer student discounts - always carry your student ID!

Gym & Fitness

Stay active with local, affordable gyms.

Welcome Gym

– open 24/7 with classes, £31.99/month or £10/day.

The Gym Group

- flexible memberships from £17.99/month or £8.99/day.

There are also plenty of free ways to stay active on and around campus!

Banking in the UK



Most banks offer student accounts with perks - compare options on sites like MoneySupermarket.com to find the best deal.

You can apply online, via app, or in branch. Once approved, your debit card usually arrives within 5 working days (the whole process can take up to two weeks).

You'll need:

- Passport (and visa/BRP if applicable)
- Proof of UK address (e.g. tenancy or accommodation letter)
- Proof of student status download your Certificate of Registration via Gradintel

Top tips:

- Update your UK address with the University before applying
- Temporary addresses (like hotels) aren't accepted
- Use digital wallets or prepaid cards while you wait
